Israeli Competitions for Young Musicians
10th Year

The purpose of the Aviv Competitions is to recognize young performing musicians who are ready for a professional career by awarding prizes in their various instruments. The Aviv Competitions are open to young musicians ages 21 to 29 (in some categories up to 35) and include every year three to five categories, repeated in a three-year cycle (except in piano which is held every two years). In each of the participating categories there is only one prize, and only if a proper candidate is found. Winners receive prize money, exposure to the public and to professional critics, and are given performance opportunities, including radio broadcasts in Israel and abroad. They are also featured on a special CD produced by the Jerusalem Music Centre.

The Aviv Competitions are co-sponsored by the America-Israel Cultural Foundation, the Tel Aviv Museum of Art, the Music Department of the Culture Administration of the Ministry of Science, Culture and Sport, and the Jerusalem Music Centre.

The competitions are free and open to the public. All events will take place at the Tel Aviv Museum of Art in two stages—except the 2nd stage in Conducting, which will take place at the Henry Crown Auditorium in Jerusalem.

The 2008 competitions include the following prizes:

The Yuri Ahronovitch Prize for Conducting - \$ 6,000

The Rafi Guralnik Prize for Piano - \$ 8,000

The Ilona Kornhauser Prize for Violin – \$ 8,000

The Francois Schapira Prize for Brass – \$ 4,000

The Minister of Science, Culture and Sport Prize for the Best Performance of an Israeli work – NIS 10,000

The Meira Geyra “Audience Choice” Prize – NIS 10,000
